# Period 7

Dear Student,

The new year brings the 2018 exam season into sharp relief. It becomes a ground-rush to secure content knowledge, practise and hone skills, and to prepare oneself fully for the challenge ahead. As with most things preparation is the key; those who have worked hard and prepared themselves fully view the exams as an opportunity to demonstrate their expertise. Conversely, those less well prepared may view the examinations as a threat and an insurmountable obstacle. With this in mind, 'Period 7' is to be instituted from Monday, 8th of January 2018. 'Period 7' is an hour of additional schooling available to all Year 11 students, from 3.00pm-4.00pm, from Monday-Friday. - Friday history

It is also worth mentioning that all the teaching staff give their time freely and willingly for your betterment. 

### From Past to Present – Ned Smith

At the recent Remembrance Service at the excellent St Mary's Church it was both a delight and surprise to learn that the great granddaughter of Maryport's Edward Benn Smith, commonly known as 'Ned Smith' VC (Victoria Cross) and DCM (Distinguished Conduct Medal) is Year 11 Netherhall School student, Rebecca Woods. Rebecca was helping out at the recent Remembrance Service, under the first-rate guidance of the Reverend Susan McKendrey and the excellent Linda Radcliffe. When, with great pride the Netherhall School students were shown the memorial to 'Ned Smith', Rebecca casually announced, 'That's my Great Grandad.'





Ned Smith joined the Lancashire Fusiliers at the outbreak of the First World War. He served throughout the entirety of the First World War and was awarded the highest and most prestigious medal for gallantry – The Victoria Cross, for actions during the Hundred Days Offensive in the Somme region of France. His citation reads:

'His personal bravery, skill and initiative were outstanding, and his conduct throughout an inspiration to us all.'

A local West Cumbrian newspaper reported,

'Sergeant Smith is not only a VC, but looks like it. He is a British soldier every inch of him. He is an A1 man from the crown of his head to the soles of his feet. He has not only won the VC, he has a chest on which to display it.'

Rebecca is a fabulous young student of formidable moral purpose, championing local community causes, campaigning for social justice and improved public services. She is a key member of the Netherhall School Student Leadership Team: sitting on the school council and an integral part of the Year 11 prefect team. Rebecca was part of the trio who were recently nominated and shortlisted to the final three for the West Cumbria Young Volunteer of the Year Award.

One does not have to look too long at the pictures and read the text to see the similarities. I suspect Edward Benn 'Ned' Smith would be incredibly proud.

Since September, Jonathan has accrued a **massive 164.5 points**, which broadly equates to twenty five books read between September and December, with a colossal **word count of 1,164,096** – well over a million words! Each book is from the reading challenge library, which is a collection of classic seminal works of children's literature – 'a rites of passage' for all young people. Jonathan usually **achieves 100%** in all of the associated quizzes, proving that he has fully read and has an in-depth understanding of the characters and text.

In addition to being an avid reader, Jonathan is a polite, charming young man, who is an excellent student and a delight to be around in school. In short, Jonathan is a reading superstar and a champion of Netherhall School.

# An Interview with Harrison Savage

Frazer, by his own admission, has been incredibly lucky to have the support of brilliant people: Mum and Dad, Kath & Steve Lawson, the remarkable Simon Lawson and speedway star Dan Bewley (both former Netherhall School students), who together have nurtured, educated, supported and guided Frazer every step of the way. Including, Peter Bell, Les Cartmel and Eddie Pullin, who commit considerable time and effort to photographing charting Frazer's considerable talent. Frazer is hugely appreciative of all of their support and attributes his success to the people named above.







Frazer has competed for Cumbria MX at all levels, currently racing at National level on a 125cc Husqvarna, having recently been 'passed off' to ride in the 14-18 age category, which is above Frazer's actual age of 12. Amazingly, Frazer currently ranks in the top three nationally in the 14-18 age group, regularly competing all over the country against a full field of 42 riders. It is Frazer's ambition to move up to the 250cc class at the first possible opportunity to race in open-age competitions.

As one would hope, it is Frazer's ambition to become World Champion. The moto-cross racing season runs from March to September, at present Frazer is racing most weekends and working hard on his skills and fitness, combining gym sessions with practising his riding skills on his BMX and mountain bike. In addition to this, Frazer plays for the Netherhall School Year 8 Football and Rugby teams.

Frazer is a champion of Netherhall School and school sport. He is an absolute pleasure, always polite, friendly, willing to engage in conversation and incredibly modest of his considerable talents. 

# Managing Medication Procedures – Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs C Savage (Assistant SENCO).

# **U12 Emerging School Tournament**


