Netherhall Sixth Form is committed to enabling all of its students to fulfil their considerable potential and we are delighted that the opportunity provided has prompted a number of current Year 13 students to consider an application to Sellafield in the January recruitment window, with a view to beginning their apprenticeships in the autumn following their A-Level examinations. <u>Cambridge University – Fitzwilliam College Shadowing Scheme</u> 16th to 18th November 2017

Last week I had the honour of attending Cambridge University on a shadowing scheme set up by Fitzwilliam College. I along with 14 other Cumbrian Year 12 students travelled down to Cambridge last Thursday on a bus.; upon our arrival that night, we met our mentors - students of Fitzwilliam College, who we would be shadowing for the next two days. My mentor, Elaine, was a third year Biological Natural Science student studying genetics. We chatted about what led her to choose Fitzwilliam over the other colleges in Cambridge, and the various different extracurricular activities she got involved in to make her UCAS application stand out. After an interesting evening, we departed to our dorms (which were kindly given to us by other college students).

The next morning at 9am, Elaine and I walked through Cambridge to the genetics building in the centre of town, where we would have our first lecture of the day. The masses of information surrounding 'the complex regulation of micro RNA biogenesis' was far beyond my Year 12 biology knowledge, but nevertheless, I listened intently, scribbling down notes that Elaine kindly explained to me at the end of the lecture.

After another lecture on 'mutation signatures in cancer genes', we had a two hour medical ethics seminar, which involved everyone sitting in a big circle and having some very heated discussions and debates on different scenarios involving heath care decisions. Following the ending of our Friday lectures, I joined up with some of the other shadows, who had been touring the other colleges within Cambridge University, to look around Sidney Sussex College - an experience I enjoyed thoroughly as I felt like I was at Hogwarts!

Later that night, all the shadows and our mentors ate dinner in the grand dining hall, and proceeded to attend 'Fitz Session'- a series of live acoustic performances from various students that they hold every Friday in the college bar. There were singers, harp players and even accordion players; it was a great end to an eventful day.

After breakfast and an admissions talk on Saturday morning, we said farewells to our mentors and

set off on our trek back to Cumbria. The experience was eye opening, and has definitely inspired me to continue my studies in the aim of being able to apply to Cambridge University next year. I received so much helpful advice from the mentors and have come away knowing so much more about university life and what it entails.




Maryport's Waverly Hotel for their sponsorship and of course to the Sixth Form charity officers who have been simply fantastic in their fund raising efforts this term.

Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs C Savage (Assistant SENCO).
